- 82.1% of students indicated that they have excellent access to supports and services. This has increased from last year (75.2%) and is higher than the province (78.7%).

Areas for growth

- When students are completing the survey, we will have an administrator read the questions and be present to answer any questions students have. Students indicated that some of the questions were confusing, and we want to make the process easier and more understandable for students.

We will continue to offer multiple methods for parents and caregivers to give input and feedback.
- We are sending out a weekly newsletter, "The Churchill Courier" on Fridays to keep caregivers in formed of what is happening at the school and in our community. School Council has reported the newsletter is very helpful.
- We connect with families throughout the year through; Churchill Family BBQ in September, Advisor phones home twice per year, Parent/Teacher Conferences twice per year, open door policy, parent information sessions (High School Pathways, Off-Campus Education and Post-Secondary, Helping Your Teen Thrive).

- Teachers believe students demonstrate the knowledge, skills, and attitudes necessary for lifelong learning. We see a student population that is curious, engaged, and interested in pursuing growth.
- Our school mission statement includes "Pursue Growth"; we will continue to reinforce the idea of aiming to be a little better everyday.
- Our school hosts events to promote the Registered Apprenticeship Program, Post-Secondary and Scholarship information sessions, and opportunities in the Work Experience Program.
- Our students have opportunities to demonstrate leadership and innovation through a variety of school-based activities, such as: Leadership Class, One Act Plays, Math Club, Interact Club, Robotics, Yearbook Club, and Grad Committee.

School Priority: To nurture an inclusive community of learners working to make our world a better place.

- Our students, staff, and parents continually demonstrate their commitment to our school vision:
- Our Interact Club volunteered at the Lethbridge Soup Kitchen over 15 of times last year.
- Our Math Club hosted an incredibly successful Northside Elementary School Numeracy Night; and were then asked to plan and run Lakeview Elementary School's Family Numeracy Night. This school year, they have already planned and run Senator Buchanan's Numeracy night.
- We are proud that four of our 2024 graduates were granted direct entrance to Medical School. This is an extraordinary accomplishment.
- Our student directed One Act Plays continue to demonstrate our students' creativity, leadership, and dedication to the performing arts. Students select the play, cast it through auditions, and direct the entire show; start to finish. Last year, the number of student directed plays expanded to 5. One of which was chosen to perform at the Provincial Festival.
- Our Student Leadership Class expanded our very successful 2023 Culture Day to a full Culture Week in the spring of 2024;
 students worked hard to ensure their classmates were honoured, celebrated, and recognized.
- We are proud that Churchill has the largest student representation from any school at our school division's ICE (Innovation, Creativity, and Entrepreneurial) Showcase Evening.
- Teaching staff continue to innovate by expanding learning opportunities for their students: Agri-Gardening, Indigenous Leadership, Flexible Learning Class, Welding, Musical Theatre, Sports Medicine, Churchill Health and Fitness, Archery, Outdoor Education, and Technical Theatre.
- Our Parent School Council hosted three Churchill Family Wellness Nights in an effort to create fun, engaging, and community building opportunities for families.
- Staff are deeply engaged in professional learning and deepening our understanding of Indigenous ways of knowing. We
 are interested in exploring how can we cultivate a school community that embraces different ways of thinking and
 knowing (relationship-building, reciprocity, and community over individual achievement).
- We recognize that learners are impacted by food security, housing, and access to health care. We are continuing to engage in conversation/brainstorming with our community partners to address these broader complexities. Through these conversations, we learned that the Northside of Lethbridge is the most underserved area in all of Alberta (Alberta Health Services).
